

Our Anchor Chart for Recounts

A recount tells about something that has happened in the past.
It is often personal and real, sometimes though it can be fictional.

**When writing a recount here are our
Must haves:**



- Catchy or snappy title
- An opening sentence that tells the reader what you are writing about.
- Recount words such as First, Next, Then & Finally— as well as On Friday, Yesterday morning, In the meantime, etc...
- Verbs (action words) in the past tense: ~~run~~—ran, ~~stop~~—stopped
- Ideas should be organized (sequenced) in order
- Ideas could be placed in paragraphs
- Detail so reader can visualize your words (early Sunday morning, I ate crisp, delicious bacon for breakfast...etc)
- A closing sentence that explains how I or the person felt about what they were recounting
- W5—who, what, where, when, why
- My work should be SPECO'd—I should check for spelling, punctuation, endings, capitals and omissions.
